Life in the Church never seems to stand still, and as soon as all the Christmas services are behind me, I have to start planning for Lent and Easter. But it's always good to look back on what has gone and to reflect on the events of 2006 and what we can learn from them.

For so many people, it was a year of relentless suffering; for the people of Iraq, the fear and deprivation they have known since the allied invasion put an end to the rule of Saddam Hussein has continued unabated. Without clean water, power and medicines, their lives must be a continual struggle for survival, quite apart from the daily fear of violence. In Afghanistan, the Taliban maintain their struggle for power and oppression. In many parts of Africa, famine and drought are only a part of the people's suffering; civil war and violence no longer make the headlines here, but still cause untold misery.

In our churches we pray regularly for peace. While we can't put an end to violence by ourselves, we can support those who have to endure it by this regular and ceaseless cycle of prayer. Many people, and most of our cathedrals, set mid-day aside as a time of prayer for world peace. It's a good discipline to pause for a moment at this time each day, and offer the victims of violence and the cause of peace to God in our hearts.

But there were many joys in 2006. Our Candle Service and Midnight Mass were just two of them, where it was standing room only for many. Because Little Bytham church is small, we will give some thought to rearranging and extending the seating for next year, so that you are not forced to stand four deep at the back again. But what a delight it was to see those beautiful little angels, shepherds, wise men and the major characters. Thank you, Judith and your helpers, Jonathan, Hillary and the musicians, for organising this once again and for bringing such pleasure to those who watched it. And how lovely to see so many of my former SHS pupils at the various Christmas services!

Thanks, too, to Angela and her Party Girls, and to Maureen and her helpers, who arranged the over-sixties lunch and the two children's parties at Castle and Little Bytham. All of them take a huge amount of organisation, and do so much to build up our community. They were lovely events, and we owe these community-minded people so much.

So what will 2007 bring? A Temple Safari, to start with! On Saturday March 24^{th} . we are going to Leicester to visit a Mosque, a Synagogue, a Sikh Gurdwara and a Hindu Mandir, with lunch at an Indian restaurant. Members of each place of worship will be there to explain their faith and to show us around. I have been several times, and have always been overwhelmed by the warmth of the welcome and the genuine openness and friendship shown - a small but significant contribution to mutual understanding and the quest for peace. The coach will leave Castle Bytham at 9.00, returning at about 5.00, and the total cost is £15 (it may be less if we fill a few more seats.) It's by no means confined to 'church people' - anyone and everyone is welcome. If you would like to come, please phone or email me to book a seat.

You may remember that last year I asked if there was anyone interested in forming a choir to sing at major festivals. I had only two offers at the time, but since then one or two more have mentioned it. I wonder whether there may be a few more still, who would be willing to come along with a view to singing at Easter - or even to sing at the monthly Communion at Castle Bytham? No auditions, no need to sight-read music, no forcible attendance at other services ... so how about it? Young and old will be very welcome indeed.

We have a number of toys to amuse smaller children at our family services in Careby and Castle Bytham, but could do with lots more. If your children or grand-children have grown out of toys or books, and you could spare them, we should be delighted to receive any offerings (though preferably not very noisy ones, or those needing batteries.) If you would like me to fetch them, please let me know.

It has been our practice during Lent to have a Communion service on Wednesday evenings at 7.00, These will begin on Ash Wednesday - details on the list of services.

Our Evensongs at Little Bytham have a discussion in the 'sermon-slot' and we shall be following the Radio Lincoln Lent Course which focuses on the environment. All are welcome, either to take part or just to listen.

I wish you all a peaceful and happy 2007, and leave you with some words which I was asked to read recently at a service.

I said to the man Who stood at the gate of the year, "Give me a light, that I may tread safely into the unknown." And he replied, "Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God That shall be to you Better than the light And safer than a known way!" So I went forth And finding the hand of God Trod gladly into the light.

Letter to the Editor


Thank you from Kath Broadbent of CB

I would like to thank everyone for their kindness, generosity and thoughtfulness after my recent burglary.



So watch this space and get ready to end your weekends with something a little different. Looking At Nature is the title of my occasional article in 'Glenside News'. I am not an expert in this field; neither do I have any of the qualifications that perhaps I should to write on the subject. But enjoying the natural world is not about being clever or qualified, it is something much more important, it is about being alive, feeling part of the natural world and seeing for yourself our fascinating wildlife.

Recently I have been recording any wildlife I see and sending my observations to The Lincolnshire Wildlife News Bulletin. This is a part of the Lincolnshire Naturalists Union, I quote from the Bulletin "The purpose of the Bulletin is to encourage biological recording in Lincolnshire, using information and communication technology"

Every week this information goes out to 670 email addresses across Lincolnshire the recipients are the recorders themselves and readers who are interested in wildlife; the information collected helps to see how our wildlife is getting along. English Nature, The Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust and local authorities all use it to help with conservation, so if you take part you are actually helping wildlife yourself.

It is not only birds or mammals that are recorded but also butterflies, moths, reptiles, insects and spiders to name a few, in fact any wildlife. Wildlife recorders are always needed and you do not have to be an expert as beginners are very welcome. If you would like to receive the report each week or become a recorder please email Roger Parsons at rparsons@enterprise.net You are not expected to send in reports weekly (although

that is welcome) just whenever you have the time.

If you are interested in wildlife then I can recommend the Bulletin even just to read as I think you will be surprised at some of the sightings right here in Lincolnshire. Recently a Sperm Whale was beached on the Lincolnshire coast and I learned about this from the bulletin and not from the TV news, every week there is something unusual or extremely rare reported that you would not usually hear about. So if you are into wildlife I cannot recommend it enough! I must say thank you to Barrie Hunt of Castle Bytham for showing me this in the first place, it has added a new dimension for me in Looking At Nature' and I hope it can for you too.

I am trying to check out local House Sparrow populations, we have quite a thriving community in our street along with a pair of sparrowhawks, so I think our balance is about right, We have several nestboxes up along with a few missing tiles on some houses so nest sites are not a problem and along with myself many of my neighbours feed the birds regularly but we seem to be bucking a national trend here with reports of dwindling house sparrow numbers, so if you have the time I would appreciate any information you can supply on house sparrows on your property or in your neighbourhood.

WI KNITTING FOR PREMATURE BABIES

With am-on-the-Hill WI have so far handed over 113 items of knitting for premature and stillborn babies to Peterborough Maternity Unit, with lots more either completed or in the pipeline. The knitting has been done by WI members, the WI craft group, friends and relations. Other knitting and crochet groups locally have also very kindly given donations.

The tiny knitted hats and cardigans are needed by the Midwives and NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit) staff, to warm up premature babies whose parents are caught out with no baby clothes small enough when going into premature labour. These items are also needed for full term new born size babies, who are cold at birth and need warming quickly. Knitted and crocheted stillborn snuggle wraps have also been given to the PMU, which midwives use when parents have a last cuddle and their photograph taken with the baby, providing a keepsake with the babies hand and foot prints.

More knitting is still being done by Witham-on-the-Hill WI and friends in this ongoing community project.

PAST TIMES

A great place to visit is the museum at Oakham and the little dark corner depicting past years has always been my favourite area. The low ceiling blackened with age, the homemade rag rug, the warped old parlour chairs, the scrubbed pine table and the huge black range are of a different age to our modern homes. No PCs, VCRs, DVDs, TVs, ITs, IPODs, MPs, laptops, digital radios or microwaves, today's youngsters might consider the past dull and so lacking in modern delights. It was lacking, but I remember those days when the old range gave off comforting warmth at the end of a tiring day. (no cars)

Heavy blinds, left from wartime days, shut us in as we sat in our favourite wooden chairs in a vague semi-circle round the fire listening to the old bakelite radio. The freshly scrubbed table probably meant Mother had rolled pastry on it and had an apple pie in the side oven. The old range was the centre of our life, pride of place and Mother blackened it religiously every week. It was decorated with holly above the mantel for Xmas and we children hung our four small mesh stockings in a row ready for Father Christmas to fill.

The museum makes one very nostalgic and in some areas I've resisted moving on. The brown earthenware pots are still the best for pickling onions in and my modern Kenwood mixer plus attachments cannot mince meat anything like my old Victorian mixer screwed to the kitchen table.

There are huge wooden carts and threshing machines etc in the museum courtyard reminding me of an incident in my youth. As a child and always horse mad, I latched on to our Co-op milkman plus horse and cart as he did his rounds. For several years I would seek him out, help with the deliveries and, as a special reward, he would let me drive the cart a little way. The very last Christmas I went with him he was offered a glass of sherry at nearly every house. His blue eyes grew ever redder and finally he climbed up behind the drivers wooden seat and collapsed in a deep sleep. So it was at 12 years of age I drove horse, cart and dead to the world milkman from the north side of Northampton to the Co-op dairy about four miles away. I only panicked going downhill towards the traffic lights as my small hands tried desperately to heave up the huge steel hand brake to slow down the cart. We got there safely much to the amazement of the dairy employees who made a story to talk about for many a year to come!

THE BYTHAMS WOODLAND TRUST – THE SPINNEY

2006 ended on a high note for the Spinney and 2007 has started equally well.

During 2006, we were successful in applying for \pounds 7,000 from the Waste Recycling Environmental Network (WREN) which operates out of the land-fill scheme at Colsterworth. The \pounds 7,000 will be used to improve the play provision for the under 5s and consultation is underway with the Bythams School, the local Mums and Tots and Playgroups to find out what they think should be put on site. We plan to have this all in place for early summer.

However, as part of this award, we also needed to raise what is called a Third Party Payment and I am delighted to say that following a series of meetings with Careby, Aunby and Holywell Parish Meeting and the Parish Councils of Castle Bytham and Little Bytham, all three agreed to help with some funding towards this cost.

So, a very big thank you to all the local Councils for their help and assistance. We really do appreciate it!

But on top of this, Lincolnshire County Council also agreed to pay a grant towards the third party payment. So, while we wish to give thanks to the County Council for its contribution, it means that the support given by our local Parish Councils can be used for other purposes.

The BWT was also successful in obtaining $\pounds 1,000$ from The Woodland Trust, a national woodland organisation, that just happens to be based in Grantham. We have used this
